

THE CELEBRATION OF EASTER



On Holy Thursday (March 24th) gather at 7.30 pm to celebrate the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper. The mass will include the moving ritual of the humble washing of the feet of parishioners by our priest and in the spirit of service and good works, we are encouraged to return our Project Compassion boxes to be offered and blessed at this mass. With the consecrated hosts removed and the alter stripped, we will leave the Church in stillness and silence, to watch and pray; the church will be open until 10pm.

On Good Friday (March 25th) at 11.00am

we walk with Jesus on the way to Calrary as we prayerfully reflect on the Stations of the Cross and at **3pm** we will venerate the holy wood of the cross. We will listen again to the Passion of Christ and take communion, as we keep watch, in stillness and silence.

This is the Passover of the Lord. It is our Passover into new life.

The Easter Vigil (Saturday, March 26th) start 7.30pm when we gather for the blessing of the fire and the procession of the Paschal candle. We will proclaim the story of salvation - from the roll-call of creation and the testing of Abraham to the liberation of Israel from Egypt. The prophets will expound on the fidelity of Israel's God and the gift of God's own spirit.

And then, the Resurrection!

How to

Spend Holy WeekWith the beginning of Holy Week, we celebrate the events of the last week of Christ's life. We follow in Holy Week those events Jesus endured, not like seeing a re-run of an old movie, but as the way to grow more closely with Jesus in his acceptance of the Father's will.

The death of Christ is a tragedy, reminding us of our sinfulness; our rejection has sent him to his death on a cross, but the story does not end with our condemnation in his death. By raising Christ from the dead God has restored life to the world. It is our calling to create conditions in our world (our family, community, nation) where human life can be lived freely and fully without fear. It is this way that we identify with Christ in his dying and look with confidence through his resurrection to a better way of life for all in a better world. Christ is a king who conquers sin and death rather than a tragic hero who just submits to death. Through Jesus we have been saved and set free. We have to pledge ourselves to continue to work against injustice and for the establishment of Christ's kingdom here and in this place we live and worship. Palm Sunday should not find us escaping from the realities of life (inflations, unemployment, violence, disillusionment) but in the spirit of the risen Christ bringing hope through our actions to combat today's evils for Christ who would be King.

Reflection

Jesus entered Jerusalem, not as a warrior in the tradition of King David as many had hoped for, but riding simply on a donkey. The disciples and the crowd applauded him, but they proved fickle in their support.

On the other hand, Jesus remained steadfast in his commitment to non-violent revolutionary change of the religious and political systems so as to establish the reign of God. Why did he renounce marshalling human and angelic warriors to further his cause?

First, Jesus embodied God-for-us, and God does not want the destruction of those he has created out of love. Second, Jesus had a premonition that an armed revolt would lead to the destruction of Jerusalem and the dispersal of the *Jewish people (as occurred in 70AD).*

Third, Luke's Gospel recounts that as Jesus laboured up Mount Calvary he turned to some wailing women and said, 'Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, weep rather for yourselves and for your children.' He knew that they suffer grievously in armed uprising. This is seen in barbaric reality in our own time with women being tortured and raped in campaigns of terror, trafficked into sexual slavery, suffering the loss of sons, husband and lovers. We could take a moment to pray that the Church of the 21st century, successor of the pacifist Church of the first three centuries, may enter on a new period of reflection on these issues, grappling with the desire to protect the innocent, yet always challenged by the man on a donkey, Divine Prince of Peace.
